Gary felt God tugging at his heart from a very young age. Gary could not stand the thought of anyone being hungry or a child not having a gift to open on Christmas morning. He also had a heart for veterans in nursing homes and his congregations purchased new pajamas and toiletries for them for Christmas. Gary also loved to laugh, had a great sense of humor, and incorporated it in his service to the Lord.

It was only a brief illness, but a very serious diagnosis of acute leukemia that halted Gary's ability to serve God during the last month of his life. But even with his progressing illness, he was still taking calls on his cell phone while in the hospital.

Gary was a loving, dedicated husband and best friend to his wife, Christine. He was a devoted and caring father to his son, Bryan and his step-son, Mike. His five grandsons, Bryan, Michael, Patrick, Dominick, and Zachary brought him the most enjoyment in his life. He also loved his fur companions, Momma Cat and Miss Kitty, and really enjoyed stirring them up.

### **EDWARD S. CARTY**

December 6, 1939 – December 12, 2014



A faithful and humble servant, a man of integrity, a great listener, one who pursued his role with a passion, are but a few of the terms used to describe the late Rev. Edward Samuel Carty. His guiding principle was "If you cannot be best, aim at giving your best".

Edward was born in Jamaica, West Indies on December 6, 1939. He accepted Christ as his personal savior at age seventeen, and six years later answered the call to Christian Ministry. He received his college diploma from the Calabar Theological College in Jamaica, his diploma in Theology from London University and his Master of Divinity from Drew University in the USA.

His Christian ministry spanned forty-one years, serving in two countries and two denominations. Twenty-three years of Baptist ministry (1966-1989) were in Jamaica where he pastored the Buff Bay Circuit of four churches and Sutcliffe Mount Circuit of five churches. In the United States, he continued his studies for two more years, then served for sixteen years at three churches in New Jersey (1996-2012): Park Ave.-St. John's UMC in

East Orange, Calvary UMC in Dumont, and Christ UMC in Jersey City, until his retirement in 2012.

Additionally, Pastor Carty served the Gateway North District on the Committee of District Superintendency, and, at the Conference level, he served on the Committee on Investigation and the Board of Trustees.

Edward's achievements included, but were not limited, to the following: 1) the building of three new churches in the Buff Bay Circuit in Jamaica, 2) the carrying out of extensive renovations to various church properties in both countries, 3) organizing outreach programs including summer day camps, vacation bible schools and feeding programs, 4) funding charities such as UMCOR, Support a Child, and CUMAC-ECHO where he organized adults and youths to serve, 5) led parishioners to The Walk to Emmaus, and the youth to Search.

Rev. Carty died after a brief illness on December 12, 2014 and was buried on December 20, 2014, the day that he and his beloved wife Viola would have celebrated their forty-seventh wedding anniversary. He had fought a good fight and had finished the race.

May his soul rest in peace and light perpetual shine upon him. He is survived by Viola, his loving wife; his three sons, Ray, Gian and Dave; two sisters, Carmen and Inez; two brothers, Andrew and Samuel, and a host of nieces, nephews, cousins, colleagues in ministry and friends.

### CHRISTA GRANT

Christa was born in Austria, just outside of Vienna, but lived mostly in Germany. At the beginning of the war (1939), she and her family moved to Hamburg where she completed her degree in music. She was not permitted to pursue a career in music, but was instead drafted as a farm laborer.

In 1947 her father was brought to the US under the auspices of Operation Paperclip, initiated by the Office of Strategic Services. Christa and her mother were allowed to join him in New Jersey a couple of years later, although they were severely restricted as "enemy aliens" for a few years and because of that, she was still unable to pursue a career in music.

In 1960 she married Andrew Grant. They moved to Newport, TN for 8 years where their son Christopher was born. There Christa finally had an opportunity to use her musical training to start a children's choir at the Methodist Church. She loved music and loved working with children. Putting these two passions together became her calling in life, and served as a restitution for all the thwarting of her dreams and aspirations of having a professional musical career up to that time.

In 1968 Christa and Andrew moved back to NJ where she again immersed herself in working with children's choral and instrumental groups through the Methodist Church. She soon became a Diaconal Minister in the United Methodist Church and served in the Summit church and later in Asbury UMC in Woodstown.

Each summer for many years, she directed two weeklong music camps for children, one at Aldersgate and one at Mt. Misery. She was blessed to be able to enrich the lives and touch the souls of many campers and choristers with whom she worked, inspiring many of them to take up a career in music.

In 2000, after retirement, Christa moved to Oregon, and in 2007 to the Cascade Manor retirement community, where she organized a choral group among the residents. She succumbed to cancer on March 31, 2015.

Before entering the ministry, he was Vice-President of Surveillance and Investigations at Resorts International Casino/Hotel and was a US Air Force veteran.




