As Native Americans who are proud of our culture, history, spirituality and our ancestors who still guide us today, we condemn the recent statement made by former Senator Rick Santorum that "there isn't much Native American culture in American culture" and that white Europeans "came here and created a blank slate." <https://www.newsweek.com/rick-santorum-native-americans-cnn-speech-1586646>

We are outraged by yet another inaccurate and divisive comment that reinforces how Native people are made invisible and blatantly attempts to erase our history. The fact that Mr. Santorum made this comment to a group of young people makes it all the more damaging to our communities.

He went on to say, "We birthed a nation from nothing. I mean, there was nothing here." Currently, there are about 4.5 million Native Americans in the United States. There are more than 570 federally recognized tribes, which of course does not count all those who are not recognized. With these many tribes come their own cultures, languages, spiritualities and histories. Despite over 600 years of occupation and genocidal policies, Native Americans continue to make enormous contributions to the church and to American society.

Leaders like Santorum, who has expressed racist and homophobic beliefs before, would like you to believe there was "nothing here," because if there was "nothing here," then the blood on their hands would not exist, and they could absolve themselves of their complicity. By erasing us from their history, they seek to render us invisible, and they smother our voices as well as the hearts and voices of our children. This is what real cancel culture looks like.

With the installation of former Congresswoman Deb Haaland as the U.S. Secretary of the Interior, we are filled with hope as she brings her own Laguna Tribal background, her veracity and wisdom to restore the dignity, safety **and** land, too often systematically stripped from Native American-tribes.

Comments like those made by Santorum cannot be ignored, nor can they be seen as an anomaly in our society. Complicity and a divisive ploy to influence our youth need to end today by calling out the damage done by his words. To that end, we call on CNN to immediately remove him from their employ.
