



## Week 1 Small Group: Peace Made Possible

### OPENING PRAYER:

### BREAKING THE ICE:

What is your favorite Christmas or Advent memory?

### WRESTLING WITH THE WORD:

Read *Isaiah 2:2-5*

- How would you describe the world in the opening chapters of Isaiah?
- Like many biblical prophecies, these passages point toward multiple layers of fulfillment. How do you see these passages pointing toward Jesus' life on earth? How do they point toward the second coming?
- What does this prophecy of the future Jerusalem tell us about God's plan?

### NEXT STEPS:

- The history of Israel is filled with violence, political disruption, and confusion. In light of this scripture, how might we trust God no matter the chaos of the world?
- What are the "swords" in your life or the world? What keeps them drawn? How can they be reformed into "plowshares"?
- What can we let go of in this season, so that we can embrace some of the peace offered to us?

Amazing God who offers us freely the gifts of hope, peace, joy, and love, we give our thanks. Help us to keep these treasures at the forefront during this busy season. Today we choose to believe in your promises and will try to live in a way that gives you all the glory. Amen.



## Week 2 Small Group: Hope Made Possible

### OPENING PRAYER:

God of hope and direction, we thank you for helping us navigate this life. Grant us the wisdom and courage this week to be opened to surprises, to see your presence in new ways, and to trust you will do good things in our lives and in the world. Amen.

### BREAKING THE ICE:

Can you remember a time during the Christmas season when you felt overwhelmed instead of filled with the Christmas spirit?

### WRESTLING WITH THE WORD:

Read *Isaiah 11:1-10*

- What is the character of the "shoot from the stump of Jesse"? How does this point to Jesus' characteristics?
- How are each of these godly characteristics different than their worldly counterpart? For example, how is Godly wisdom different from the world's understanding of wisdom?
- Read the contrasts in verses 6-8. What might they be alluding to? Are there any surprises?

### NEXT STEPS:

- How does it encourage you and inspire you to see God's faithfulness in the midst of our broken world?
- What is the hope that Jesus offers to us? How does that influence our daily lives?
- As we approach Christmas, how can the hope that Christ will come again encourage, comfort and preserve us? How are we being called to wait?

## Week 3 Small Group: Joy Made Possible

### OPENING PRAYER:

Creative God, we thank you for the countless opportunities we have each day to live fully and joyfully. Help us to remain close to you and not lose the spirit of Christmas, but instead to celebrate your presence with us each day. Amen.

### BREAKING THE ICE:

### WRESTLING WITH THE WORD:

Read Isaiah 35:1-10

- Joy is different than happiness. Can you define joy?
- What does this Isaiah 35 text tell us about God's action in our joy?
- How do you see God bringing dead things to life in this passage and in your own life?

### NEXT STEPS:

- What words from the passage speak to challenges you are experiencing right now and how? (For example, how is your life "parched" or "feeble" or "speechless"? Looking at the scripture, what is the contrast that God is offering? What does that mean for you?)
- What do you turn to when you are needing some joy? How might this scripture change your habits?
- In this Christmas season, have you experienced God's transformative joy?

### CLOSING PRAYER:

Amazing God who offers us freely the gifts of hope, peace, joy and love, we give our thanks. Help us to keep these treasures at the forefront during this busy season. Today we choose to believe in your promises and will try to live in a way that gives you all the glory. Amen.



## Week 4 Small Group: Love Made Possible

### OPENING PRAYER:

O God of incarnation, we thank you for your gift of love which greets us in this season. Give us the grace to be like the shepherds and the angels in spreading the good news that a Savior has been born! Help us to live fully in the light of your amazing love. In Christ's name, amen.

### WRESTLING WITH THE WORD:

Read *Matthew 1:18-25*

- What do you learn about Joseph from these verses?
- Consider the historical setting of the Christmas story and the human reality of it all. What could have been a typical reaction to having learned that Mary was pregnant?
- Why does Joseph's plan in verse 19 show that he is a righteous man? What do you think of his plan?

### NEXT STEPS:

- In this scripture God is called Emmanuel, which means "God is with us." When have you experienced God with you?
- Joseph's experience with the angel led to his transformation. Has there been a time in your life when an experience made you change your course?
- How does Joseph's story encourage you to cooperate with God even when God wants you to do something very difficult?

## Week 5 Small Group: God Found in Impossible Places

### OPENING PRAYER:

### WRESTLING WITH THE WORD:

Read Matthew 2:13-23

- There are three Old Testament prophecies that are fulfilled in this text: Micah 5:2,4 (Matthew 2:6), Hosea 11:1 (Matthew 2:13-15), Jer. 31:15 (Matthew 2:18). What is their significance?
- How do the prophecies in the chart point to what Jesus will be like and what role he will play?
- What is the significance of Nazareth?

- Joseph followed God's instructions immediately. What is the significance of this? How does this align with your response to God?
- Share a time when you needed to move forward, even when life was uncertain.
- What is the significance of Jesus being known from a place that others looked down on? What does that teach us about God? Where might be "Nazareth" today?
